## Today's Program.....

Local historian and journalist Don Faber described many of the accomplishments of Stevens T. Mason in Michigan between 1830 and 1840. Mason was born into a well-educated, politically powerful Virginia family; his older brother George participated in the Constitutional Convention. His father was appointed Secretary of the Michigan Territory in 1830 by President Andrew Jackson. In 1831 the President replaced the father with the son, who was 19 years old at the time.



Mason commissioned a territorial census (completed in 1834) that showed that the territory had enough inhabitants to qualify for statehood. He was proactive in promoting improvements in the Territory's infrastructure (roads, railroads, and canals). (Senator Henry Clay disparaged his proposal to build the Soo locks.) He helped write a state constitution for Michigan, and proposed the establishment of a state Superintendent of Education, the first of its kind in the country.

In late 1835 the constitution was approved and Mason was elected Governor, but the state of Ohio, as well as the Michigan Territory, claimed a strip of land (about 440 sq mi) around Toledo. Congress would not recognize Michigan as a state until the dispute was resolved. There ensued the Toledo War of 1835-1836.. Faber said that there were no casualties because the two militias fired at each other across the relatively wide Maumee River, using rifles that were ineffective at that distance. The upshot was that in 1836 Mason agreed to give Ohio the disputed area around Toledo in exchange for about 9,000 sq mi in the western U.P. Michigan finally became a state in early 1837, and Mason was re-elected Governor.


Before becoming Governor, Mason has borrowed significant funds to carry out his plans to improve the state's infrastructure. Unfortunately, 1837 was also the year of the nation's first nationwide depression. The financial difficulties of the state, plus charges that he had perpetrated fraud, led him to decide not to run for Governor in 1839. He went to New York to practice law, but did not fare well. He died of pneumonia in 1843, at the age of 31.

Decades later Mason's body was exhumed and buried in Detroit, where he was acknowledged as a great Governor. In 1955 the body was exhumed again to make room for a bus station. In 2010 it was exhumed once more, and Faber spoke at that ceremony. Of Mason he said, "you really can't keep a good man down."


