Today's Program...

Surgical Advancement in 3D:

Sherry Springer introduced today's speaker Dr. Glenn Green MD an Associate Professor at the University of Michigan in Otolaryngology (Ear-Nose-Throat) - Head and Neck Surgery. He is located in Mott Hospital and is heavily involved in research on hearing and tracheal development in children; he is a leader in the invention and development of surgical techniques and devices for complex airway reconstruction. Along with Scott Hollister, Ph.D., he is a coinventor of a 3D-printed tracheal splint. He is also involved in developing several other patents, for 3D-printed scaffolds for facial reconstruction for ear and nose defects as well as making devices to treat airway obstruction in children with craniofacial defects. He presented several stories of pioneering efforts to save the lives of specific children using new medical applications of 3D-printing. He passed around a couple of examples of specific splints and devices that his group had created.

Dr. Green has been recognized with numerous awards and was recently received at the White House for his outstanding work. He is clearly a leading player in the use of 3D-printing for clinical purposes. He noted that a major issue they are encountering is how to deal with regulatory mat-

ters involved in developing and producing "medical devices." These issues relate to dealing with the FDA and insurance companies. It was pointed out that their medical applications of 3D printing originated from the close access they have had to a pioneering UM engineering program that has been significantly involved in 3D-printing technology for a number of years in connection with the auto industry. Overall this was a very interesting and informative talk .


