Alive and Well: Art and Alzheimer Care

Dennis Powers introduced speakers Jeanie Powers, Gretta Spier, and Mary Wakefield who described their program at the U of M Museum of Art that brings individuals with minor and severe memory loss from the UM Daycare Program and from Huron Woods to the museum to tour the galleries and participate in multisensory experiences designed to create connections between individuals and art.

The UM program is modeled after a similar program started about six years ago in New York. Our speak-

ers, all docents at the museum, have developed very successful activities using music and other sensory experiences to engage individuals and create connections with art. Examples included an interesting demonstration using portraits in the museum to generate personal histories and the demonstration of a Japanese tea ceremony to create a sensory atmosphere and connect with individuals. Transitional objects were discussed as well emphasizing their importance to the overall experience.


