Today's Program...

Kiwanis International President Sue Petrisin:

Ron Gardner proudly introduced Kiwanis International President Sue Petrisin. Sue is from East Lansing and is the first female president of any international service organization. She is also the first Kiwanis International President to have been a Key Club, Circle K, and Kiwanis District Governor. She announced that KI has reached its five-year goal of raising (in cash and pledges) \$100 million to help eliminate maternal and neo-natal tetanus around the world.

When the project started, tetanus was a major medical issue in 38 countries. Through the efforts of KI and its partnership with UNICEF and USAID, 17 countries have been removed from the list as of January 2016. Four more countries will soon be removed and UNICEF teams are poised to move into 11 additional countries by 2018. When tetanus immunizations are provided, measles and polio vaccines are also given. KI provides the money for the tetanus shots. UNICEF and USAID order medications and provide entry

into the countries. The vaccines are given by local providers within each country at local clinics. Pres. Sue said that the clinics she visited in Cambodia were very simple. There was no electricity, no running water, no transportation system, and no quick means of communication. She said village chiefs would go door to door to personally invite residents to come to the clinic for the shots.

She thanked our club for being the 2nd club to pledge \$100,000 to the project. Thanks to the efforts of **Ron Gardner** and the Eliminate Committee and the generosity of club members we have raised more than \$105,000 and 31 of our members are Walter Zeller Fellows for donating at least \$1,250 each. Pres. Sue said that she has thoroughly enjoyed the journey of being KI President. She will soon be off to the International Convention in Toronto and then will be going Taiwan for a return visit. She is very proud of KI and the more than 110 million service hours members perform each year.

Pres. Sue surprised **Ron Gardner** with an impressive plaque and pin from Kiwanis International for his dedication to and support of the Eliminate Project. Ron graciously accepted the recognition on behalf of all club members and on behalf of the mothers and children whose lives have been saved because of our participation in the Eliminate Project.

Voucher Help Needed...


Community Services Committee Co-Chair **Bob Carr** took a few minutes to explain the club's Voucher Program and to encourage all members to sign up for an occasional Thursday morning shift (9:15 to 11am at KCW). At least seven people are needed to staff each Thursday morning session. **Ellen Webb** leads program and makes sure that all helpers know exactly what to do. (The program's procedures can be found below.) The Voucher Program, now in its 20th year, is the club's primary way of providing direct aid to individuals and families in need. Each week up to 10 recipients arrive at KCW with their caseworkers and a list of items they truly need. With our assistance they "shop", selecting the items they need. This administrative year, the club will "return" more than \$60,000 worth of donated materials to those in need. You need not be a club member or current volunteer help. If you have a friend or family member who can help, please let Bob or Ellen know. No special skills are needed and working on the Voucher Program is a wonderful way to share the Kiwanis experience while helping others.

KIWANIS VOUCHER VOUNTEER PROCEDURES KIWANIS CENTER WEST

- 1. Plan on arriving at 9:15am and we try to be done by 10:30am.
- 2. You will be given a clip board with a pen, calculator and list of suggested category amounts.
- 3. Ellen will have already checked the social worker and client in and assigned a voucher amount. These are determined by the status of the client and their needs.
- 4. Introduce yourself to the social worker and client.
- 5. Please keep the voucher in your possession while you are "shopping" as you will need to keep track of what is purchased and the amounts. It is best to keep a running tally so the client doesn't go over the voucher amount and have to put items back. The social worker is responsible for working with the client to keep them focused, moving along and making good choices. You will have another client to work with at 9:50am so everyone will have to keep that in mind.
- 6. They are not allowed to make substitutions as they were to provide an exact list of items needed. There are times when this isn't strictly enforced but we try to keep to their original list as much as we can.
- 7. Both you and the social worker need to sign-off on the voucher. You will then bring the completed voucher to Ellen who records the final amount.
