Evan LeRoy introduced our speaker Robbin Pott, who is a lawyer and researcher from the University of Michigan Law School and Ford School of Public Policy. Much of Ms Pott's work has been dedicated to child advocacy and wellbeing. In 2015, Robbin Pott decided to move from research to becoming a job creator, especially for those who face challenges in finding and sustaining employment. Ms Pott found a business opportunity in the growth and distribution of cannabis.

The mission of Pott Farms is to provide jobs along with support to help employees succeed, to provide high quality cannabis to customers, to use restorative and perma-culture techniques in the growth of cannabis on fallow farmland in Augusta Township, to support the local economy by hiring locally and paying good wages, and to help investors build wealth while doing good. Ms Pott answered many questions about the project and the uses of marijuana. She explained we are just beginning to learn about medical uses of cannabis; there are over 3,000 varieties. Israel is the global leader in researching medical uses of cannabis. The old view of marijuana as only a party drug is giving way to a new appreciation of its complexity and benefits.



Kiwanis Scholarship Program 2019

How the Program Works:

Kiwanis will support two categories of "full ride" scholarships at Washtenaw Community College in

2019 - 20. <u>Category One</u> will consist of eight scholarships for first year students who are Ann Arbor residents and 2019 graduates of the Ann Arbor Public Schools with financial needs. <u>Category Two</u> will consist of 10 students, also AAPS graduates, who have successfully completed their first year at WCC, but who would probably be unable to continue their studies without additional financial support. Each scholarship in both categories will be for \$3500, which will cover tuition, books, and fees for the entire year. Students will need to successfully complete their first semester studies in order to be eligible for second semester funding. Kiwanis will also contribute \$2000 to an emergency fund which students with unexpected hardship expenses can draw upon when necessary.

The Kiwanis Club of Ann Arbor Board of Directors and the Children and Youth Services Committee have together budgeted \$18,000 for academic scholarships this year. In addition, the Cross Foundation has again generously agreed to "match" the individual donations of Club members. The following chart describes our financing plan.

Costs:

Category One: 8 Scholarships x \$3500 = \$28,000 Category Two: 10 Scholarships x \$3500 = \$35,000 Emergency Fund: = \$2,000 Total: \$65,000

Fund Raising Plan

As the chart above demonstrates, Kiwanis members will need to donate \$23,500 to fully fund the scholarship program at the \$65,000 level. We especially salute our matching donors for making this possible. We also plan to continue our Kiwanis tradition of hosting a luncheon for all of our scholarship recipients with all of the hoopla and celebration we've had in previous years.-
