#### TODAY'S PROGRAM...Michael Cox, Ann Arbor Chief of Police

President William introduced Ann Arbor's new chief of police, Michael Cox. Chief Cox was sworn in on September 24, 2019. He comes to Ann Arbor after a 30 year career in the Boston Police Department where he was most recently bureau chief, Bureau of Professional

Development superintendent, for the Boston Police Academy. Prior positions included deputy superintendent of the Boston Police Department Bureau of Field Services and commander of the operations division. He was in charge of Boston's 911 operations on the day of the Boston Marathon bombing.

Chief Cox is firmly committed to community policing. While acknowledging Ann Arbor's very good police department he plans to do things a little differently going forward. Much

greater emphasis will be placed on having every member of the AAPD interacting positively with individual citizens and community groups. Patrols and police activities will be tailored to meet the differing needs of the city's neighborhoods. Implementing the changes will take some time and training so that patrol officers and staff are positioned to succeed. After this brief in-

troduction the chief opened the floor for questions...

Martha Petroski—Your strong background was good reason for Ann Arbor to hire you, but why did you decide to come to Ann Arbor? A: Ann Arbor is a wonderful place to live where I could bring my experience to bear. The opportunity seemed very attractive after 30 years in Boston and as I near the later stage of my career.

Dale Leslie—What about the police oversight committee? A: In Boston the oversight committee reviewed citizen complaints. Ann Arbor's committee is trying to determine its role, but I see the accountability as a good thing.

Susan Smith—Neighborhood associations are already registered with the city. Accessing that list would be a good start for engagement efforts. A: Thank you, we'll take advantage of

Garry Evans—How do you separate AAPD activities from those of UM Police? A: If the incident is on campus, UM Police handle; off campus it's handled by AAPD.



#### TODAY'S PROGRAM CONTINUED...

**Dennis Powers**: Packard Street near campus is an accident waiting to happen where it's difficult to see pedestrians at crosswalks. What can be done to improve lighting/markings? <u>A</u>: I'll take that up with the departments responsible.

**Garry Donner**—Ann Arbor's crosswalk law and crosswalks close to bus stops create confusion for drivers. Also, considering mass shootings and bombings, what do you bring to Ann Arbor to enhance safety, especially in schools?  $\underline{A}$ : I bring the knowledge of what it means to go through a major traumatic event. That experience will be reflected in the planning and procedures implemented by the AAPD.



**Bob Gray**—Who handles crowd safety at big events like football, UM Police or AAPD? <u>A</u>: Events like that are a county-wide cooperative security endeavor.

**Dan Dever**—To what extent will you use foot or bike patrols in community policing? I haven't seen many lately. <u>A</u>: I want patrol modes that enable citizen interaction—foot, bike, etc. are part of that. I want neighborhood input on that as all areas don't want or need the same type of police presence. You will see more of these patrols downtown and near campus starting in December.

**Francine Bomar**—How will you communicate procedural changes and how will you receive feedback? <u>A:</u> We will use our website and direct contact with community groups.

**Jim Dries**—Having a retired AA police officer in my neighborhood was a positive thing. Will you encourage police to live in the city? <u>A</u>: Yes, but police officers also have legitimate reasons for living outside Ann Arbor and are very dedicated to serving the city regardless of where they live.

**George Gilligan**—What percentage of officers live in the city? <u>A:</u> A very small percentage. I live in the city, but understand why many officers don't (often for financial reasons).

**Dick Smit**—What is your position on coordinating activities with police agencies in the out-county areas? <u>A</u>: Cooperation with these entities is very important and there is already a high degree of coordination that will continue. Criminal activity does not observe community boundaries.

We thank Chief Cox for taking the time to visit and answer our questions today.




