Peace Neighborhood Center

Susan Smith introduced Bonnie Billups, Executive Director of Peace Neighborhood Center. Peace was founded in 1971 and its mission is to provide programs for children, families, and individuals who are affected by social and economic programs. Peace helps people discover options, enhance skills and make choices that lead to self-sufficiency and

positive community involvement. Peace was started by the mothers living in the low-income projects and assisted by the Zion and Trinity Lutheran Churches.

Bonnie has been at Peace since he was hired by former Director Rose Martin 1976 when he was 10 years old. He moved to California for 7 years but came back to Peace and succeeded Rose as Executive Director in 2006. Peace regularly services around 100 kids throughout the city but primarily in the South Maple area of Ann Arbor. Peace serves around 15,000 meals a year. Peace has a \$700,000 budget and receives grants from the United Way and other organizations, but most of its funding is from individuals and family foundations.

Peace has relationships with Washtenaw Camp Placement and our Kiwanis Club. 
