TODAY'S PROGRAM...

Today's speaker, Doug

Pearsall

President Elect Dan Dever introduced today's guest speaker, Doug Pearsall, Senior Conservation Scientist from The Nature Conservancy. Mr. Pearsall, who's been with the Nature Conservancy for 24 years, received his PhD in natural resources from what was then UofM"s

School of Natural Resources and Environment and recently led the completion of biodiversity conservation strategies (CAPs) for Great Lakes Michigan and Erie.

Though officially formed in 1950, the work done by the Nature Conservancy really started in 1915 when leaders gathered to support ecologists and the preservation of natural areas. Land purchases and conservation easements came in the 1960's

while leaps scientific / in knowledge and education led to bigger projects and expansion outside of the United States during the 70's and 80's. Exponential growth followed with Conservancy projects spread throughout the world in areas of climate strategy, food security, and partnering with businesses to address damage caused by various industries.



servancy is to preserve the water

and land on which we all depend for life. Their vision is a world in which diversity of life thrives, with people acting in a way that conserves nature for its own sake and for ability to fulfill our Dan Deverintroduces needs. Their main reasons for (and benefits of) owning pre- today's quest serves are to protect nature in general, to connect people with

nature, and to provide conservation education, demonstrating land management practices and how to deal with invasive species. Preserves are used to educate the public, to promote healthy flora and fauna, and some are even open to tourism, raising funds to further the mission. Studies show that we humans greatly benefit from being out in nature. A mere 10 minutes a day can reduce stress levels and blood pressure, giving one a virtual "nature pill". Working together in identifying the benefits, costs and threats to the local people, plants and animals is essential for a healthy future for all of us.

Mr. Pearsall took some questions from the crowd, informing us that 1, yes, deer fences do work, 2. a simple boot brush will go a long way in stopping invasive species, which can greatly harm local environments, and 3. when controlling one's own little piece of the environment, there's no perfect way and it really boils down to the goals and objectives for the area. It doesn't have to be Man vs. Nature; management is ok and can be done in a manner that keeps both happy and healthy. It's clear the Nature Conservancy will be a great resource to our Club as we move forward with the KEEP, helping us to identify our goals and to best work with the environment we have.
