TODAY'S PROGRAM...FRESH START CLUBHOUSE

Today's speakers, introduced by **Deb Jones**, were Rachel Hanning and Kelley Rivenburgh of the Fresh Start Club-

house. Fresh Start is a non-clinical program aiding adults living with seri-



ous mental illness. The Ann Arbor Clubhouse is one of 47 in Michigan and is part of Clubhouse International that has over 300 clubhouses in 30 countries. The Ann Arbor clubhouse operates with a staff of six working with about 30 active members on a day-to-day basis and a total membership of 100-120.

Fresh Start is based on the Fountain House model of psychosocial rehabilitation where members provide mutual support and encouragement to celebrate accomplishments and regain self-confidence. The goal isn't specific job training, but imparting skills and confidence that can be transferred to a variety of job and life situations in the outside world. The staff is small to enable greater member opportunities to work in and learn from club operations. This work is divided into units of responsibility:

THE CULINARY UNIT—"Fresh Start" may erroneously bring to mind Ann Arbor's latest farm-to-table produce emporium. While it's not that, food is an important part of what they do. The Culinary Unit is responsible for preparing, serving, and cleaning up lunch daily. This includes menu planning, shopping, gardening, sani-

tation, and wellness programming. The unit also operates the Fresh Way Café, which sells refreshments, meal tickets,

and other items.

THE CO-OP UNIT-The Co-op Unit is responsible for orienting and outreach of members, tracking attendance, member | Kiw records, finances, reception, public relations, and other support. The Co-op offers opportunities to learn clerical, computer, and other professional skills.

EMPLOYMENT—Employment support includes creating resumes, assistance with applications, job searching, mock interviews, and professional skill development. Employer partners include Driven Engineering, Zingerman's Roadhouse, Zingerman's Cornman Farms, Lucky's Market, and Aramark (food service contractor to Mott Hospital).



In order to become a Fresh Start member an individual must have a primary diagnosis of a serious mental illness, indicate an interest in rehabilitation, be 18 or older, be able to independently meet safety and self-care needs, not currently pose a threat, be a client of Washtenaw Community Mental Health, and complete a formal tour of the Clubhouse. Once a member, an individual remains a member for as long as they like.

Fresh Start is funded through Medicaid, donations, and fundraisers. One of their more important fundraising sources is UM Football parking at their 2051 S. State location where they can park up to 80 cars on a football Saturday. Think about it if you're in need of a new parking spot.
