TODAY'S PROGRAM...WASHTENAW COUNTY LAW UPDATE

**Steve Hiller** introduced today's guest speaker, Washtenaw County Prosecuting Attorney Brian Mackie (who also happens to be his boss). Growing up in the 50s, Prosecutor Mackie explained how cases like the Little Rock Nine, the story of Ruby Bridges and his early work at the University of Michigan's Children's Hospital, made a big impact on him and how he viewed the world around him.

Prosecutor Mackie grew up Washtenaw County and attended both Northern Michigan and Eastern Universities and received his law degree from Wayne State University. First elected in 1993, he's currently serving his sixth term as Prosecuting Attorney. He's the past president of the Prosecuting Attornevs Association of Michigan, past chair of the Prosecuting Attornevs Coordinating Com-

mittee, current chair of the Michigan Crime Victims Services Commission, and co-chair of Michigan Fight Crime; Invest in Kids program.

Prosecutor Mackie talked to us about the various duties of the Prosecuting Attorneys office, including, but not limited to;

-The Child Support Division. This division, 2/3s of which is supported by the federal government, both establishes paternity when parents are not married and issues orders of child support. This is essential in ensuring children are provided for and to provide parental rights for fathers.

-The Probate Division. This division deals with those on probation, those who may be delinquent and/or absconding from justice and with mental health petitions. They also handle cases involving both child and elder abuse. These are considered by the office to be the most important cases they're involved in.

-The Appellate Division. This division both files appeals of cases they've lost and defends appeals filed against cases they've won. They also train assistant attorneys and police officers on the law and how it's applied. It's stressed to trainees the importance of "being right" before bringing charges. They take this very seriously and know that every piece of evidence must be weighed, no matter how big or small the crime. Knowing when to charge and when to not charge is crucial in ensuring the rights of all citizens are protected.

Prosecutor Mackie surprised us with the statement that "the most important defense attorney is the prosecuting attorney". He says this because they're responsible for defending the rights of EVERYBODY. Twenty-five to thirty percent of cases brought to the prosecutors office are denied due to the fact that the accused person's rights matter too. And remember - the police arrest, the prosecutors office brings charges, and, if found guilty, a judge hands down the sentence. The constitution must be upheld, even if it seems the wrong thing to do at the time. This can be difficult to explain to victims, regardless of how big or small the crime. To the victim, his/her case is the most important thing happening.

Though general crime has actually gone down. violent crime is still a problem in this state and focusing on rehab, education and job training can be key to turning this around. More police on the streets correlates to less violent crime but the funds to provide these services are sorely lacking. Many things, including public opinion, can determine how we move forward in this area, but progress is being made.

We thank Prosecutor Mackie for spending his afternoon with us and for his service to the citizens of Washtenaw County.

George Gilligan had happy dollars for both an upcoming extended trip to Florida and to pay up the fines he knows he'll miss while



# WARM THE CHILDREN

Providing New Winter Clothing For Needy Children

"Serving the Children of the World" is the Kiwanis slogan, and for the past twenty-five years the Kiwanis Club of Ann Arbor has put the slogan to work serving their community's neediest children with a program called Warm The Children.

It works this way: the successor to the local newspaper, AnnArbor.com, asks it readers for monetary donations. All of the money collected is used to buy new clothing and footwear for needy Ann Arbor area children. Families to be served are referred by area public school staff. Volunteer shoppers (this is where Kiwanis comes in) are assigned families who they meet at an area Walmart store; together they select about \$90 in clothing and footwear for each child. Walmart bills AnnArbor.com for all purchases.

Mary Stewart, program coordinator and daughter of program founder, Mack Stewart., is the club's Warm The Children contact person. In 1997, the Ann Arbor News (now AnnArbor.com) embraced the program. Doug Ziesemer, former WTC contact, describes what happened this way, "Cathy O'Donnell, then an editor at The News, asked me if our club's members would serve as volunteer shoppers. My club has always been very careful about committing to any new program that requires member hours because our K Thrift sale is our big fundraising project and requires full member support. When we decided to support Warm The Children it was a big step for us. Looking back it was the right decision. A number of our members have been shoppers since the start. It is a program our community needed and has grown every year."

One of WTC's shoppers is Kiwanian Lynne Lande, who told of her experiences: "I've been a volunteer shopper since our club began participating in Warm the Children. I really enjoy the shopping trips. I often have a family with five or six children. One year I met with a mother with ten children. Each child receives \$90 worth of clothing. It impresses me how efficient and wise the mothers are in selecting clothing for each of their children and in keeping mental tallies of how much they have "spent" for each child. When we get to the cash register, they are often within \$1 of the \$90 limit. It also is fun to interact with the children and see their excitement about a new snowsuit and boots or a pretty sweater and slacks. The \$100 gift certificates for the Kiwanis Thrift Sale introduce more families to the wonderful bargains they can find there year round. Warm the Children also warms our hearts. It is a great partnership between the program, the volunteer shoppers, the Ann Arbor newspaper that solicits monetary donations, and the local stores, which honor the vouchers and work so graciously with the shoppers and families."

Kiwanis in Ann Arbor serves "fifty plus" families each year and takes on special needs families such as those with large numbers of children and ones where the parent doesn't speak English. "Starting some years ago," he said, "the club began giving a \$100 gift certificate to be used at their Kiwanis Thrift Sale. This enables the family to get things they need beyond clothing and footwear for the children, and provides an opportunity for them to learn what the Kiwanis Thrift Sale is all about."


