TODAY'S PROGRAM...Foundations Preschool of Washtenaw County

Dan Burroughs introduced us to today's special guest, Sandy Williams, Executive Director and Director of Development for Foundations Preschool. Foundations Preschool is a non-profit with the goal of assisting at-risk and low-income children in receiving the early educa-

tion and experiences that will prepare them for academic and social success later in life. And they've been doing this for over 80 years.

Foundations Preschool began as Perry Nursery School, one of four such institutions opened as part of a WPA program in 1934, and was a great help to working mothers during WWII. Of the four schools opened at the time, only Foundations Preschool survives today. The program provides essential resources to children who would otherwise miss out on the basics to building a happy and

productive future. Child care can run more than 10k a year and, for a low-income household, is a barrier to employment, health insurance and the general upward mobility that will help alleviate the poverty afflicting so many today.

Foundations Preschool helps to remove this barrier for many parents by offering quality child care and education at no cost or on a sliding scale for those who can pay a portion. The school is open 5 days a week, 11 hours a day, allowing parents to work full time, all year round. Teachers are highly trained and accredited, with a ratio of 7 or 8 children per adult. A Toddler Room was just added, allowing for children as young as 18 months (oldest are 6 years). An average of 180 children are served each year and

are provided with free meals and snacks each day (36k a year!). Parents are also supported with financial programs, social worker visits and intervention, a food pantry and other parent meetings where they learn the skills necessary to help their families thrive. In addition to education and child care, health screenings, including auditory, vision and dental, are provided. With 36% of the clientele speaking Spanish as a first language, translators are also on staff to ensure no one in our community is missing out on these life-changing benefits.

As Sandy notes, many children in low-income homes are starting school already 1-2 years behind academically than those from more well off households. Quality early education is the key to allowing a child to reach his or her full potential in life and Foundations Preschool does a great job of providing it to the most vulnerable in our society. Not surprisingly, there's a waiting list for this highly exceptional program.

During Q&A, **Claire Dahl** asked if Foundations directed families to the KC Thrift Sale and, indeed, they do. Some students live in homes without basic necessities that many of us take for granted. These households are assisted with the Family Emergency Fund, which can be used to purchase beds, kitchen items, towels, etc., at the affordable KC sale prices. **Dan Dever** asked how students get to school and was informed of the car pools many used and the fact that that school is located steps from the AATA Packard bus line.
