## **TODAY'S PROGRAM...**Washtenaw County Update

President Hampton introduced today's speaker, Michelle Deatrick. According to her Wikipedia entry, Michelle is a politician, activist, and poet. Deatrick served in the Peace Corps in East Africa, and as Vice Chair of the Washtenaw County Board of Commissioners. She was

a policy analyst at Stanford University. She is a graduate of Wesleyan University (Connecticut) and holds Master's degrees from Harvard University and the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor. In 2018 she ran for Michigan State Senate, narrowly losing in the primary. Michelle moved to Ann Arbor 15 years ago for graduate school, loved the area, stayed and put down deep roots. She spoke to us today as a private citizen regarding the state of Washtenaw County.

Michelle presented a series of maps and demographic, economic, and quality of life statistics that profiled life in Washtenaw County. Some highlights...

- Washtenaw County is part of a seven county region that comprises about half of the state's population.
- We are the state's sixth largest County with about 370,000 people currently.
- Recent state population growth has been about 1% per year vs. 7% in Washtenaw.
- Michigan's slower growth relative to other states will probably result in the loss of one congressional seat after the 2020 census. The drop from 14 to 13 seats will somewhat reduce Michigan's influence in Congress and would be the first time since 1920 that

Michigan had so few seats. About 75% of county residents identify themselves as white, 12% as black or African

- American, 8% as Asian, and 5% as other or multiple races.
- 13% of county residents live below the poverty line, which is above the national average.
- Average income for males is about \$66,000 while females on average earn \$48,000.
- The county is the eighth most economically segregated area in the U.S.—meaning if you're wealthy, it's likely your neighbors are too and vice versa.
- Residents of Ann Arbor zip code 48104 have a life expectancy nine years longer than residents of Ypsi's 48198. (Sounds like it's time we all moved to 48104.)
- Housing prices have increased about 60% in the last five years exacerbating the existing shortage of affordable units. A recent study indicated Ann Arbor needed 2,800 additional affordable units, while Pittsfield Township needed 342 units. This is on top of the significant growth needed in market-rate units.
- We live in a beautiful area and have protected some 3,300 acres of land from development. In the process we've encouraged the continuance of small farms.
- The American Lung Association gives Washtenaw an "A" for particle pollution and a "D" or "F" for ground-level ozone.

#### TODAY'S PROGRAM CONTINUED...

• There are nine school districts in the county and all, except Ann Arbor, are losing enrollment. Test scores are pretty good. Opportunities for extra-curricular and enrichment activities vary widely across districts from ample to nearly non-existent.

• The county ranks eleventh best out of 83 counties in road quality. Some broad challenges the county is facing: 5% of county residents don't have access to high-speed internet and 10% can't afford it. Real wages have gone down 1.5% per year over the last decade for blue-collar and service workers. Local government funding is broken—constitutional limits on taxation have had unintended consequences for local governments.

In the Q&A after her talk, **Dennis Powers** asked if UM's Wolverine Pathways wasn't helping in extra-curricular opportunities—yes, but still a problem. **Dan Dever** noted that part of Whitmore Lake District's problem is a high proportion of mobile homes which send children to the schools but not tax revenue because they are taxed as personal property. **Dale Leslie**, community booster and historian, asked if Dixboro could be included on future maps—doubtful. **Martha Petroski** 

asked if anything could be done to level the playing field between public and charter schools regarding the services they are required to provide—Michelle acknowledged the disparity, but said it could only be addressed at the state level.

**President William** commented that he had been trying to arrange Michelle's talk for about two years and was very pleased it could be done before the end of his term as president. He then presented Michelle with the traditional thank-you "Rotary" mug, reminding her we spell Rotary, K-I-W-A-N-I-S.




## Happy Birthday to you...




