#### TODAY'S PROGRAM...



Garry Donner

Evan LeRoy introduced our own Garry Donner who grew up in Coldwater and attended the U of M where he majored in math and physics. After graduation, Garry had an ordinary, run of the mill life working for SEMCOG. While working for SEMCOG, he started a game design firm. In 1985, Garry felt ready to go full-time with his game business and hasn't looked back. Life is a game for the self-described Mr. Toyman who gave his talk while wearing his favorite Mr. Potato Head t-shirt. Garry makes his living designing and brokering the licensing of original games invented by people he represents. One of the successful inventors he represents is his daughter Wendy who invented Tip of the Tongue, Pencil Nose, Joe Name It, Say It, and many more. In total, Garry's company has licensed more than 400 games to Mattel, Hasbro and other game manufacturers.

To sell a game to a manufacturer, he first sends a photo of the game prototype along with an information sheet with key points about the game. If the manufacturer is interested, it will generally request a video of people playing the game. Garry makes 'snazzy' videos in which he has been known to ham it up to help show his games in their best light. Manufacturers love it when videos show kids laughing and having fun. Videos are key to bringing games to contract. A manufacturer may pay several thousand dollars to option a game for an agreed upon period of time while it determines whether it believes the game will be successful. When a game is actually licensed, Garry and the game's inventor split the royalties 50/50. Royalties are generally 5% of the wholesale price of the game. For example, if a game retails for \$10 and wholesales for \$5. After all contractual costs, Garry may get 20 cents per unit. The trick is to present the right games to the manufacturers and hope that the manufacturers will produce, package and market the games in such a way that they sell a lot of units over a long game-lifetime.

A million selling game will generate about \$200,000 in royalties. Most game-lifetimes are about 2 years but Garry's Tumbling Monkey's game was a huge seller in France for many years with the number of units sold increasing by tens of thousands each year. Tumbling Monkeys spawned similar games involving Toy Story characters, Minions, Jurassic World dinosaurs, and a second Toy Story version of the game. According to Garry, he and his game inventors love it when a game is so successful that it spawns other games. Another game that was a good 'spawner' is Stinky Pig which spawned Belching Mikey which spawned Burping Sponge Bob. The latter two involve shared royalties with Mutant Ninja Turtles and Nickelodeon. The royalty percentage is a bit lower per unit sold but the increased sales-volume more than compensates. Garry's Sequence for Kids has sold over two million units. And the royalties keep coming...

While Garry's games are sold and enjoyed world-wide, you will not find his name on the box or the instruction sheet. Once a game is licensed to a manufacturer, the manufacturer controls production, marketing and distribution. Top game manufacturers are Hasbro, Mattel and Lego. Top game retailers are Walmart, Target and Amazon. With the demise of Toys 'R Us, stores like Target, Barnes and Noble, and JC Penney have greatly increased their game inventories. Thanks, Garry, for sharing the inside scoop on the gamesmanship of gaming.
